This English-speaking missionary family live near Rocchetta Tanaro, a village near Asti, in the centre of the Piedmont Region of north-west Italy.

This is a beautiful, rural area with wonderful countryside and vineyards; their home is about an 1.5 hour's drive from the Italian Riviera in Portofino and Camogli. About the same distance is the regal metropolis of Turin. There are also many other lovely places to visit at short distances. They live down an unpaved road, near a slowmoving river with sandy banks, great for sunning and picnicking. No neighbours except for the occasional wild hog, pheasant, badger, deer, or fox. Gentle wooded hills

rise literally from their front yard to the Natural Park of Rocchetta Tanaro.

A one hundred year-old ruin is near the house and another across the slow-moving brook. The village centre is about 5 minutes away by car (25min by brisk walk) and is home to an ancient family of nobility (Incisa della Rocchetta) that has called this area their home since the 1200's. ASTI, the city about 25 minutes away by car, has a colourful and vibrant open-air market Wednesdays and Saturdays. Asti is world renowned for foods and wines, and just south (25-30 minutes by car) are the famous vineyards of Barolo and Barbaresco. Public transport is not great here, so a car is rather important.



There is a large, private, hedged garden. They grow a lot of plants in pots, so daily watering is a must in the heat of the summer. This is a wonderfully peaceful garden with trees, nearby brook, fields and forest, hills & rolling countryside. Al fresco eating in

the cool of the evening is a joy. They have a small & large barbecue for house swappers or house sitters to use, and plenty of seating areas.









LaRocca Vineyard Church meets in the family's home, and services are in Italian, but often translated into English or German when necessary. The church closes in August for summer.
